## To review and refine the TOR of NIA-WG, aligning with the interests and NIA requirements of Member States

## **Original Objective**

To identify best practices, sets of institutional models and legal frameworks for national geospatial information management and interoperability between different systems and institutions responsible for its management, while ensuring uniformity and standardization. The institutional models should provide Governments with options on how best to create national geospatial entities.
